



- Avon and Somerset Police's Integrated Victim Care (Lighthouse Team)

 Somerset Integrated Domestic Abuse Service (SIDAS)

Evaluations were completed online following the event - thank you to all those who took the time to respond. Although responses were not received from all delegates, 71% responses said they found it helped increase their knowledge – which is good news!

### **Domestic Abuse Housing Alliance**

On 1<sup>st</sup> July 2015, the Avon and Somerset Police Crime Commissioner held an inaugural event for housing providers across the whole force area to look at best practice to raise awareness of domestic abuse within their organisations.


The Domestic Abuse Housing Alliance's (DAHA) mission is to improve the housing sector's response to domestic abuse through the introduction and adoption of an established set of National Domestic Abuse Service Standards. These standards are centred on the following principles:

- Safety
- Being person-centred
- Taking a believing/non-judgmental approach
- Confidentiality
- Inclusivity

DAHA offer an accreditation process that takes between 3-12 months at the end of which the Housing Provider receives the DAHA Chartermark signalling that it has a robust and nationally accredited response to domestic abuse.

### **Domestic Homicide Reviews**

Since 2011, Community Safety Partnerships are expected to undertake a multiagency review following a domestic abuse related death. The purpose of this "domestic homicide review" is to help identify lessons that maybe used to help prevent future deaths and abuse.

In Somerset, we have had 13 notifications of deaths for consideration under the criteria of a domestic homicide review. A total of 4 formal reviews have taken place, and 3 of those review reports have been approved by the Home Office for publication, (the fourth is pending approval). These approved reports can be found online at www.somersetsurvivors.org.uk.

Currently, there are also 2 domestic homicide reviews in progress and these are expected to conclude by Spring 2016.

### Child to parent violence – new resources

"Responding to Child to Parent Violence" is a multi-agency research project led by the University of Brighton, in conjunction with European partner organisations. They were brought together to study the emerging problem of abuse perpetrated by children on their parents and carers.

Child to parent violence: "...any harmful act by a teenage child intended to gain power and control over a parent. The abuse can be physical, psychological, or financial." Cottrell (2003)

After two years of research, planning and filming they have produced two films about CPV, The first captures professionals' thoughts on what is meant by CPV (5 minutes). The second reports key findings from our action research project for policy makers and practitioners (25 minutes).

### **New Safer Somerset Partnership Structure & Priorities**



2015/16 PRIORITIES:

- Improve links to other partnerships, interagency collaboration and understanding of services
- Prevent the escalation of violent crime and abuse by supporting victims and working with perpetrators
- Focus on *targeted* Anti-Social Behaviour
- Focusing on Families through Early Help
- Identify opportunities and approaches that Improve mental wellbeing and the emotional resilience of people in Somerset
- Break the cycle of offending/abuse through an engaged multi-agency

A new structure has been approved, which means there will be a Strategic Group, Tactical Group and geographically based multi-agency arrangements. Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence are cross-cutting issues that are likely to feature throughout.


